1.0 PREAMBLE

The State Independent Electoral Commission was established for each State of the Federation by section 197 subsection 1(b) of the 1999 constitution (as amended) of the Federal Republic of Nigeria. Whereas OSSIEC was set up to oversee the conduct of Local Government Chairmanship and Councillorship Elections for all the Local Government Councils in Osun State. However, two of such elections that were held in the past, in the year 2007 and 2022, owing to observed flaws relating to not keeping to constitutional provisions were subsequently nullified by competent Courts of Jurisdiction. By implications, much of public resources committed to the exercises went down the drain. Consequently, the Board of the Commission considered it expedient to avert such negative outcomes in future elections. Hence, the Commission sought the services of the under listed Academics to help carry out the itemized objectives:

3.0 OBJECTIVES

- To review the operations of the Commission over the years,
- To assess the level and adequacy of the preparation for the forthcoming elections of 22nd February, 2025.

- To point out areas where gaps may still exist that could affect the successful outcome the proposed election, and
- d) To make necessary recommendations.

4.0 REPORT FOCUS

To carry out needed verification, assessment and evaluation of the OSSIEC operations, the Team Interacted with members of the Management Board of the Commission and perused available relevant documents.

1. Electoral Law and Compliance

a. Nigerian Constitution

Section 7 of The Nigerian Constitution guarantees a "system of local government by democratically elected Local Government Councils". The same Constitution equally compelled the Government of every State to, subject to section 8 of the same Constitution, ensure their existence under a Law which provides for the establishment, structure, composition, finance and functions of such Councils. (Annexure 1)

- The first schedule, section 3 of the same Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria listed that there shall be 30 Local Government Council Areas in Osun State, Nigeria. (Annexure 1)
- Part II, Sections 3 and 4 of the First Schedule of the Constitution equally provides for the establishment of State Independent Electoral Commission to superintend the conduct of elections of Chairmen and Councilors into Local Government Councils, (Annexure 1)

b. OSSIEC Constitution

The Osun State Independent Electoral Commission (OSSIEC) Law of 2005 and 2022 as amended established the OSSIEC, stating among others its powers, structures, functions as well as the processes through which the elections are to be held. (Annexure 2)

c. Electoral Guidelines

The OSSIEC towards the proposed Local Government Council election holding on the 22nd February, 2025 issued a Guideline - Voter Education and Electoral Guidelines: 2025 Local Government Elections - for the conduct of the election. The Guideline, among others, made provision for the following critical components of election:

- 1. Nature of Osun State 2025 Local Government Council elections
- 2. Notice of elections
- 3, Eligibility for voting

- 4. Voter's Card
- 5. Qualification/Disqualification of candidates
- 6. Procedures for nominations
- 7. Voting procedures
- 8, Collation of results
- 9. Electoral officers
- 10, Campaigns
- 11. Electoral offences, and
- 12. Election petitions.

In addition, the Commission in preparation for the February 22, 2025 elections also provided OSSIEC Election Manual for Officials and Political Parties. (Annexure 3)

2. Election Preparation and Operation

The electoral activities of the Commission can be streamed into three main parts.

- a) Pre-election
- b) Election and
- c) Post-election

3. Administration

The Commission

The Commission is govern by the Chairman and the Commissioners. It has six (6) Directorates:

- 1. Legal Services
- 2. Information and Public Relations
- Operations and Logistics
- 4. Finance and Account
- 5. Administration and Supplies
- Information and Communication Technology

The OSSIEC law provided for the establishment of Local Government Area Offices of the Commission in all the thirty (30) Local Government Areas, (Annexure 2)

b. The Committees

The Directorates and the Committees were established to oversee and discharge the Commission's duties,

c. The Executive Secretary

The Executive Secretary is statutorily recognized as the Accounting Officer of the Commission, and custodian of all statutory records.

d. The Chairman

The Chairman is a tenured apex authority of the Commission providing direction for all the electoral and other non-electoral but related activities of the Commission.

The work of the Independent Assessors was guided by the above constitutional, administrative and operational framework. During the data collection, the Team interacted with documents, staff of the Commission and the Commission's website. The details of the assessment are therefore so guided.




Figure 1: Allocation of Funds for Local Government Elections.




Figure 2: Level of Independence of the Commission




Figure 3: Production of Electoral Guideline




Figure 4: Adherence to Guideline




Figure 5: Existence of Election Time Table




Figure 6: Release of Notice of Election




Figure 7: Compliance with Constitutional Provision on Notice of Election




Figure 8: Compliance with Same day Election




Figure 9: Security Arrangement for the Election




Figure 10: Comparison of Mode of Publicity




Figure 11: Consultation with Political Parties




Figure 12: High Level of Participation of Political Parties




Figure 13: Adequate Number of OSSIEC Staff




Figure 14: Ad-hoc Staff Recruitment Process




Figure 15: Gender Configuration of Electoral officers




Figure 16: Deployment of Technology




Figure 17: Establishment and Operationality of Area Offices




Figure 18: Verification, Assessment and Evaluation of OSSIEC operations




Figure 19: Observers Participations




Figure 20: Observation of Parties Primaries Election by OSSIEC




Figure 21: Adherence to the criteria for Nomination of candidates




Figure 22: Functionalities of the Committees of the Commission




Figure 23: Frequency of the OSSIEC Committee meetings




Figure 24: Establishment of Local Government and Area Council Election Appeal Tribunal




Figure 25: Setting up of Election Review Evaluators




Figure 26: Compliance with Statutory Format of Ballot Paper




Figure 27: Readiness for Contingencies




Figure 28: Record keeping by the Commission




Figure 29: Infrastructural Enhancement of the Commission






Figure 30: Improvement in Electoral Personnel Remunerations

5.0 General Observations

The following observations were made during the exercise;

- a) There was no proper record keeping from inception. However, through innovative creation of Commission's website, there is an improvement in record keeping and public access to information.
- b) There is a general infrastructural face lift in the Commission.
- The Commission now deploys technology for operational efficiency.
- d) Establishment of Area Offices and appointment of Resident Electoral Personnel across all the 30 Local Government Area Councils,
- e) The team also observed an open door policy among all hierarchies of Staff.
- Collaborative spirit among the workers.
- g) The results of the comparative analysis above revealed the level of preparedness of the Commission for the conduct of 2002, 2022 and 2025 elections. By implication, the Commission, having followed due process now, is scientifically adjudged to be well prepared for the conduct of the February 22, 2025 elections.

6.0 Recommendations

The following recommendations are made

- a) The commission is advised to pay serious attention to archival retrieval and enhancement of record keeping. For an Institution of this nature, this should be seen as an indispensable task which should be treated with utmost importance and urgency.
- b) In particular, all laws, guidelines and documents relating to past, present and future elections should be securely archived and access to them made available as at when needed by the appropriate authorities.
- c) Notwithstanding, the necessity of constant staff mobility in institutions such as this, it is desirable that measures (such as effective handing over of offices and operations) be put in place to ensure administrative continuity for institutional memory.
- d) It is advised that the ongoing noticeable improvement in the Commission be sustained. The Commission is also advised to study the result of the SWOT analysis for the purposes of future decision making and strategic planning.
- It is recommended that there should be institutionalization of post-election audit and evaluation.
- It is also recommended that Verification Exercise such as this should be carried out from time to time for Quality Assurance purposes.

7.0 Conclusion

The exercise provides a valuable insight into the operations of this key institution of democratic governance, the Osun State Independent Electoral Commission (OSSIEC). Major gaps were noticed in the operations of the Commission from inception. Happily however, the Commission is evidently in the upswing in the area of operational efficacy, adherence to law, technological adaptation and avoidance of public resource wastage. We recommend that this improved trajectory be sustained.
